Letter from the Chair

Dear Alumni of Harvard University's Program in Regional Studies-East Asia.

Happy 2023! And Happy Year of the Rabbit!



The Program in Regional Studies East Asia is in full swing, enjoying our second year back on campus, and the first year with a roster of in-person events that rivals pre-Covid days. Life on campus feels almost "normal." Our students have been actively preparing for the upcoming HEAS conference on February 17th and 18th, and they are finalizing their grant applications for summer funding. Our G2s are also hard at work on their theses, pursuing a broad range of topics, from the life and work of Kim Hyang-an to the destabilization of the Taiwan Straits from within Taiwan. Over the next few months, our students will be receiving competitive job offers and offers from top PhD programs. Graduation will soon be upon us, with 26 students set to earn their AMs.

Shortly before the holidays, Harvard announced that current Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences Claudine Gay would become president of Harvard, effective July 1, 2023. will be meeting to admit a class of 25 from 184 applicants. I'm also very thankful for the tremendous contributions of Professor Jie Li (Director of Graduate Studies), Rosie Cortese (Program Administrator) and Kerry Tanwar (Program Assistant). RSEA is what it is because of their tireless and inspiring service.

RSEA also is what it is because of our phenomenal alumni. Thank you for your continued involvement.
